## **Grammar Focus: Nouns**

Learning Objective: Identify different types of nouns.

Nouns are words that name people, places, things, and ideas.

#### **Common Nouns**

General names for people, places, things, and animals - farmer, dog, book, city, love

#### **Proper Nouns**

Specific names for people, places, things, and animals - Roz, London, PlayStation

Proper nouns are capitalised

## **Noun Pictionary!**

To play, you will need:

- a partner
- · paper or a whiteboard
- a timer
- Ex. 4 Chose a person to be the drawer and the other person to be the guesser. The drawer chooses a noun from "The Wild Robot". Start the timer for 1 minute and begin drawing. The guesser has to correctly guess the noun being drawn within the time limit. Swap roles so both players have a turn drawing and guessing.

If you have enough people (at least 4), you can make this game competitive by making two teams. One team chooses a drawer, and their team members have to guess the noun within the time limit. If they guess the word they score a point. Then the other team chooses a drawer, while their team tries to guess the noun within the time limit.

### Writer's Craft: Nouns to Set the Scene

Learning Objective: Analyse how nouns are used effectively in setting the scene.

Read Chapters 12- 13 of "The Wild Robot".

In this extract Brown, uses nouns to set the scene and create a vivid picture of the environment.

Ex. 1 Underline the nouns in this passage. Can you find all nine nouns?





Deer were wading through the flooded fields. Beavers were busily collecting a trove of fallen branches. Geese honked in the sky before splashing down into a watery section of the forest.

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Nouns are the building blocks of sentences. Brown has used precise and concrete nouns that clearly identify individual animals. Naming some of the animals present, deer, beavers, geese, and describing the activities the animals are engaged in, allows us to understand how the animals are still thriving in their own unique ways despite the storm devastating their surroundings.

Brown's use of specific nouns has made this scene more authentic and helps us visualise the characters in our minds.

  - Write your own descriptive paragraph based on the picture. Using at least three of your nouns to create a detailed, vivid scene.


## Spelling: long 'a' spelt with 'ei'

Learning Objective: Learn and practice spelling the long 'a' sound using "ei".

When the letters 'e' and 'i' are next to each other in a word, they make the long 'a' sound, just like the "ay" sound.

Example words: eight, weight, neighbour, vein, freight
